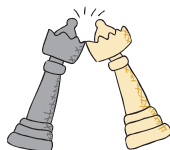

"This is our bastion of creativity."—**Laura P.**, discerning arts connoisseur.

No doubt, Laura is right. For, dare I say where else in camp (outside of ceramics and wood-working) do campers explore their imaginations with such verve and enthusiasm. Consider the following examples:

Alex K. is presently constructing a miniature replica of the waterfront using clay, foam, wood and metal. He's added a surreal touch by having a ferocious crocodile chew a corner of the dock. **Jonathan H.** has drawn an intricate blueprint for his sculpture and is also using mixed media of pipe-cleaners, wood and felt. **Bennie P.** created an outstanding dragon of clay augmented by wings made by **George M.** (who, by the way, I suspect may have a future as an artist) and **Emily W.** continues to astonish us all with her delightful watercolors. Continuing with our pillow tradition, many campers are working with our new fabulous fabrics. **Trevor P.** and **Theo A.** made hip lobster pillows and I really like the Bear fabric that Super Senior **Max L.** chose (hey, **Max**, thanks for running down to the Lodge twice for staples!) and **Danny R.** is pillow-insatiable and has already added several more to his prodigious collection. **Becca N.** is a rising star in A&C and devotes great concentration to each project.

Frankie A. made an amazing pond tableau with the new Magic Clay we're using, and **Tommy L.** molded a charming piece. Upper Senior Girl **LJ V.** exhibits talent in virtually all arenas.

Oh, there's more. Campers worked on duct-tape wallets and duct-tape sunglasses and girls in the variety show NameTags even made duct-tape tee-shirts! Cool, eh?

Perhaps the most exciting project in Notches has been the introduction of decorated hot-air balloons in the style of Dale Chihuly, perhaps the finest artist working in glass since Louis Tiffany who presently has as exhibit in Boston's Museum of Fine Arts. Campers create the illusion of glass pieces using cut-up water bottles and then carefully using a heat gun to create wild, dancing shapes and compelling flowers. Even the illustrious and indomitable **Ginny P.** is making a sculpture using discarded Sprite bottles which gives the piece a brilliant hue.

For second session, we'll be making scented soap and candles, collage stationary, tee-pees, totem-poles and more. **Laura** is absolutely right.

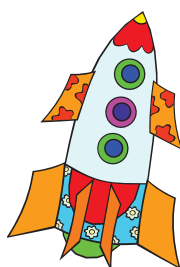


DISCOVERING THE LOST RIVER

Camp Out & Breakfast Cookout *By Greg P.*

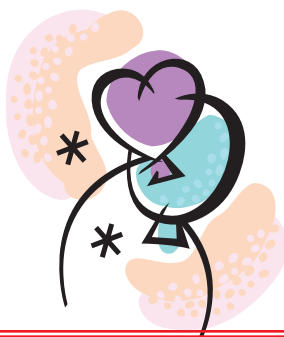

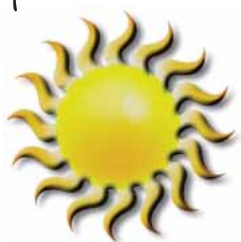
Supers Against Bullying
